The Moralne Club was opened in 1930 under the watchful eye of Alec "Nipper" Campbell who not only laid out the course routing but also was the pro; the panorama from #1 to #18 is exquisite in the ever changing elevations, and the green complexes are varied from one to the next sloping toward the player and then away. A player must think clearly on his 2nd shot to the 4's and although the par 5's seem reachable, again the player must think twice before taking the risk; #2 and #12 are the key holes for the 3's and at 218 #2 is uphill to an extremely sloped back to front green and at 229-#12 heads #2 is uprint to all extremely stoped back to from green and at 22##12 medias toward an angled green surrounded by bunkering and mounds. The player must be patient on these 3's while #5 and #15 - the other 3's, provide the distinctive aura of the "Nipper" and his design. The beauty of this course is in the passion of its golfers who have allowed the sands of time to pass and yet the routing and green complexes continue to stay as they were in 1930. Formed by glaciers many years before the first golf ball was ever struck in Scotland, course architect, Alec "Nipper" Campbell laid out Moraine on three major premises: he did not want an excessive number of bunkers nor man-made hazards, he wanted the golf course to conform to Moralne's natural topography, and he wanted to fashion a number of holes after the most famous holes in his native Scotland. Blessed with wonderful ground forms, Moraine has persevered through time and remains a wonderful
