

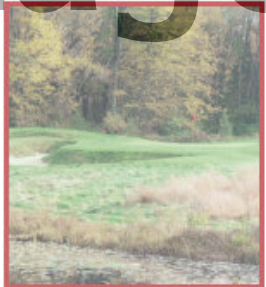

Myopia is the only course in the U.S. to have been listed as having two of the U.S.'s Top 100 signature holes, the 4th and 9th. Myopia has hosted four Opens, 1898, 1901, 1905 and 1906 and the winning score in 1901 by Willie Anderson at 331, is a record high score that still stands today. He defeated Alex Smith in an 18 hole playoff 85-86. Herbert Leeds designed this course with the first 9 being completed in 1896 and the 2nd nine not finished until 1901 so the 1898 Open actually played on 8 rounds of nine holes. The course has as much character per hole as any course in the U.S. The random placement of hazards and the shape of the bunkers remain particular highlights to this day. The scattered bunkers on the 255 yard brute 3rd hole leave the golfer few bailout options and the bunkers that front the 4th and 9th greens could only be found at Myopia. One consequence of its bunkering is that the rifle straight driver of the ball enjoys a huge advantage which was Leeds intention.
