To speak of Peachtree in Atlanta is to speak of Bobby Jones, for it was he who was the inspiration behind it. His ideas were followed by architect Robert Trent Jones, and Peachtree has ever since been one of the premier golf clubs of Atlanta and the place that Bobby Jones considered his golfing home in his later years. The course was built during the late 1940s among azaleas and dogwood in the typically hilly countryside around Atlanta. Marching up and down these hills in the hot summer months can make it purgatory to play, but the anguish is more than compensated for during the other seasons — particularly the spring. The start is awesome, with an initial 391-yard par four, with two bunkers set in the dogleg which force the drive out to the right of the fairway. The 2nd is simple but superb. A 584-yard par five, it is bunkerless but has a green protected in front by a lake and stream. In 1989 Peachtree played host to an historic Walker Cup — the first victory on American soil by a side representing Great Britain and Ireland.
