The Canterbury course was designed by Herbert Strong in 1922. It is not excessively long, but the problems caused by the 14 doglegs and the Lake Erie winds produce a course that favors the long hitter. From the 16th a 611 yard monster, the run-in is very tough and has sealed the fate of many a player. When played into the wind, the short?, 232 yard par 3 17th can require a wood to reach the raised double-tiered green, flanked by bunkers and guarded by out-of-bounds on the right.

Then comes Canterbury's last and most difficult hole, its fairway uphill for 433 yards and lined with trees, with O/B to the right and a viciously trapped green. It is often said that if par is held in these three holes, the victory is almost assured. Since 1932, Canterbury has hosted 13 major tournaments ranging from the Western Open to the US Open to the US Am to the PGA..
